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

A new year, new hope, new promises and new beginnings. It is a good time to reflect on what has been accomplished and the changes to undertake in the new year. I wish to thank our community members, supporters, donors, staff and volunteers for their hard work and dedication.

An overview of last year's operations resulted in:

- TDCALA providing service to over 1400 unique clients and learners from 15 different countries of origin.
- 8212 hours of instruction were provided through our many programs.

- 2 new board members came aboard Sid Tams and Trent Ervin. Welcome to the leadership table!


It was a busy year. It is amazing what needs can be addressed by working collaboratively in our communities.

The remarkable addition of the ADULT BASIC EDUCATION COURSE

In September 2022, the educational landscape in Southern Alberta welcomed a transformative addition - the Adult Basic Education Course (ABE). This innovative course has quickly become a resounding success, changing lives and opening doors to new opportunities.

This course was launched with nine students, almost double the number of students that were expected. Since then the course continues to meet and exceed enrollment and satisfaction targets.

The ABE course is designed to provide a strong foundation in mathematics, reading and writing skills. This comprehensive approach allows participants to build a solid base from which they can launch into more advanced academic upgrading programs. As demand for the course continues to grow, calls are starting to come in from other parts of the province to expand access to this initiative. It's clear that the ABE course is addressing a crucial need in the region, offering valuable skills for both work-life and daily living.

One of the program's greatest strengths is its adaptability. It serves as a stepping stone for indi-

viduals looking to improve their skills and knowledge. Whether it's learning how to write an essay or gaining the confidence to fill out forms and start their own business, the course empowers its participants to take control of their future.

The course is not confined to one location, it is accessible both in person and online, reaching participants from various areas. The 11-week program runs three nights a week. It's not just about the academic curriculum; the course is also a confidence-building journey.

The success stories emerging from the ABE program are a testament to its positive impact. The Adult Basic Education Course is not just an educational initiative; it's a catalyst for personal growth, increased confidence, and improved career prospects. Open to anyone aged 18 or older, it has become a lifeline for those seeking to improve their academic skills and make a significant impact on their lives. In just one year, it has grown from a local solution to a province-wide necessity, leaving a trail of inspired individuals in its wake.

ABE 102 This course will help learners to upgrade their understanding of reading, writing and math. This 99-hour program runs three evenings per week for 11 weeks. This course is intended for adult learners who struggle with work related and/or daily reading, writing and math tasks; or for those learners wanting to upgrade their academic skills before enrolling in the Canada Adult Education Credential preparation program.

The future of Adult High School Equivalency

GED transitioning to CAEC

The GED has been a longstanding pathway for adult learners to gain their high school equivalency credential to support employment and training goals. Recognized by employers, industry and government ministries, the GED has become important to many in our region's communities. Taber Adult Learning has run GED preparation classes for many years graduating between 20 and 30 learners per year.

On August 1, 2023, students across Canada that had registered for the Canadian GED program received an email from the GED Testing Service stating that the Canadian GED series exams would be ending on May 3, 2024. This move, while not surprising, was not anticipated to happen so quickly or abruptly by most GED preparation programs and writing centers.

Education ministries across Canada have been developing our own high school equivalency credential, and had advanced so far as to pilot exams in 2021 and 2022. However, the credential was not yet complete enough to reveal as the GED placement across Canada. GED Testing Service's announcement in August took the Alberta Education ministry folk responsible for the GED in Alberta off guard.

The replacement for the GED will be called the Canadian Adult Education Credential (CAEC). Learning outcomes will be released later in fall 2023 or early winter 2024. This will allow service agencies such as TDCALA to plan for fall

delivery of the new high school equivalency credential. We will release further details as they become available.

We anticipate that adult learners who would have otherwise registered for the GED will be able to register for CAEC beginning September 2024 here in Taber. TDCALA remains committed to ensuring that an equivalency credential pathway is available for learners in our region.

Nurturing Community Growth:

The role of Taber's EAL Drop-In Centers in supporting Language Education

The EAL Drop-In
Center in Taber
plays a vital role in offering opportunities to those
in the community who are
attempting to learn the
English Language. Taber
is one of three locations in
Alberta with a drop-in center, the other two being in
Edmonton and Calgary.

The center runs morning and evening classes that have seen considerable success. This last spring, the centre offered a set of extra classes that were very well received by learners.

These classes cater to those who seek to improve

their English skills, meeting the learning needs of a diverse range of learners.

One hallmark of the Drop-In Center's English classes is their focus on conversational proficiency. Conversational classes held in the evenings provide an interactive space for participants to enhance their speaking and listening skills. This approach recognizes the practical importance of being able to communicate effectively in a language.

Vauxhall has become a hub for these language classes. The Drop-In Center extends its services to this area, recognizing the need for language education among the diverse population, including Ukrainian workers welcomed by local farmers. Last year in response to the influx of Ukrainians, the center offered

additional classes in Enchant and online to meet the emerging needs. This initiative is a testament to the center's adaptability in meeting the ever-evolving needs of its community.

To cater to diverse skill levels and specific needs, the Drop-In Center adopted a more flexible model by running two evening English classes divided by proficiency level. This approach not only accommodates local residents looking to improve their language skills but also temporary foreign workers who

have signed up for higher-level classes.

Taber's Drop-In Center is a testament to the power of community-driven initiatives that cater to unique local needs. In a town with its own distinct identity and challenges, this center stands as a pillar of support for language education. By focusing on conversational proficiency, expanding to neighboring communities, and customizing learning experiences, the center has successfully navigated the balance between the expectations set by funders and the needs of Taber and area residents. It serves as a shining example of how dedication, adaptability, and a deep understanding of the community can make a significant impact in nurturing community growth through education.

The vital role of Learner Support Programs

L'success. At TDCALA, it also helps community members navigate the many and complex community supports. This support plays a pivotal role in ensuring that individuals from diverse backgrounds and experiences can access and thrive in learning environments and participate more fully in our communities. Learner support programs exist to address learners' and community members' challenges and ensure that no one is left behind.

One of the primary goals of learner support programs is to serve as a central hub for information and resources. Many potential learners are struggling to navigate the increasingly digital landscape of education and information. Learner support programs bridge this gap by offering guidance and assistance, ensuring that these individuals can access services, information, and skills development opportunities.

From July 1, 2022, to June 30, 2023, the learner support program served over 700 clients, and 1000 service requests with over 1300 hours of service. This represents a significant increase from the previous year, nearly doubling the number of clients seeking assistance. It's evident that more people are recognizing the value of these programs and actively seeking help, especially since the closure of the Alberta Works office and MCC Taber office.

Learner support programs are invaluable in ensuring that education is accessible to all. They provide a central hub for information, resources, and referrals, effectively guiding learners on their educational journeys and enhancing their ability to navigate the complex networks of community supports. The stories of transformation, where learners go from feeling overwhelmed and burdened to confident and empowered, and community members go from feeling disheartened to feeling supported, demonstrate the profound impact of learner support programs. It is clear that these programs play a vital role in leaving no one behind.

Canada-Alberta Job Grant TRAINING PROGRAM

A training program where the employer applies on behalf of their present or future employees.

Employers decide who gets training and what type of training may be needed for their employees.

Employers are required to contribute one-third of the total training costs for existing employees. Government contributes two-thirds of the cost to a maximum of \$10,000 per trainee per fiscal year.

If hiring and training an unemployed Albertan, up to 100% of training costs could be covered, up to \$15,000 per trainee.

Eligible Employees include:

- Canadian citizens
- Permanent residents
- Business owners (incorporated, unincorporated, sole-proprietor, partnerships) with 4 or fewer employees, including all owners, are now eligible trainees
- Employed family members

 Temporary Foreign Workers and family members that are not currently employed with the business are not eligible for this program.



This phase acts as a springboard for what is to come, instilling confidence in our program participants. Participants spend the next 12 weeks exploring their interests and honing their skills. Employers provide valuable on-the-job experience, and many times, permanent positions. This phase is the true essence of the program, as it gives participants a glimpse of what a fulfilling career can be.

The program offers quality employ-

ment opportunities in a wide variety of settings. It's about making a difference and providing an environment where participants can thrive. The program is dedicated to removing barriers and offering additional support, ensuring that participants are positioned to succeed.

The program's success rate speaks for itself, with a remarkable 75% of participants being employed for at least an additional 12 weeks after completing the initial 19-week program. This extended employment period underlines the transformative impact of the program. 




